
Purpose statement

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Goal of the course

The goal of the course is to give the participants an overview of esthetic and functional surgical procedures of the face and neck. This course will help the participants to develop their professional competencies, enhance their practical skills, and elevate their aesthetic practice.

Target participants

This course is aimed at fully qualified specialists in oral and maxillofacial surgery, ENT surgery, or plastic and reconstructive surgery, as well as residents in their last years of training.

Learning objectives

After the course, participants will be able to:

- Describe the surgical anatomy of the face and neck
- Recognize the differences of the anatomical structures in females and males
- Describe the theoretical process of treatment planning and perform the steps is using fillers, botulinum toxin, and threads
- Describe how to perform common aesthetic and functional surgical procedures of the face and neck
- Describe the major complications after surgery of the face and neck

Course description

This two-day intensive course on fresh frozen human anatomical specimens is designed to present and covers all essential procedures in aesthetic and functional surgery of the face and neck. Two participants will share one specimen station. Each session will include a step by step introduction followed by an on-site demonstration. We offer you the chance to practice under the guidance of experts who will share their in-depth knowledge and experience as well as tips and tricks.
