I look forward to welcoming you all to the Eternal City and to EACMFS 2024 Congress.

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
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# **BARCELONA** calling



# Maxillofacial Surgery at UNICAMILLUS: Leadership that guides students to a new level of education



Professor of Maxillofacial Surgery at UniCamillus not only stands out for his medical-scientific excellence but extends beyond, embracing the "Students for Research" initiative. This project goes beyond theoretical training, involving all students of medical and dental degrees in approaching scientific research from critical analysis of literature to publishing articles. The dense network of teachers/physicians provides valuable support, allowing students to become active in creating and publishing articles from the early years of their courses.

The leadership of Maxillofacial Surgery is clearly evident in contributing to scientific research as demonstrated in the assessment of Admiral Horatio Nelson's facial fractures. Two medical students, Iga Mamińska and Martina Longo have been evaluating what happened during the Siege of Calvi at 12 July 1794:

The Admiral suffered several injuries during his adventurous life as an officer of the Royal Navy: he lost the sight of his right eye in the siege of Calvi, his arm in the attack on Tenerife, he was then wounded in the skull in the battle of Nile and then died during the famous Battle of Trafalgar.

The scientific interest of the two young students is aimed at evaluating what happened in Calvi. Admiral Horatio Nelson was wounded by stones in the face. He called himself fortunate, for not being hit directly but by the strong flow of ricocheted stone chippings from the sandbags of the battery, which hit his face and breast.



Following these injuries he suffered the consequent loss of sight in his right eye, as widely reported by historians. *From this injury comes a* 

#### worldwide famous expression "to turn a

*blind eye"*, which is believed to come from the siege of Copenhagen, in which Horatio Nelson, as a response to the withdraw order, pretended not to see the flagship's signals to do so by putting his glass to the right, injured and blind eye. In addition, the right side of his face was injured too, covered with bleeding lacerations at the scene and causing deformation, visible at various relicts representing his face which remain until this day.

In our study we are discussing the morphology of the face of the Admiral to establish that the impact caused by the stones ricochet among already described injuries, also a fracture of right zygomatic bone. That fracture is our object of interest and is included in our scientific hypothesis which implies that zygomatic trauma was also a direct cause of his blindness.

The OMFS clinic in Bonn, Germany is an academic institution: 25 doctors are involved in surgical treatment and patient care, teaching both medical and dental students and performing several competitive research projects. The clinic operates three theaters per day and covers all areas of OMF surgery with a strong focus in reconstructive surgery.

"Mentoring in our clinic is an important issue. We use it to promote the transfer of knowledge between experienced and less experienced people. Ideally, the experienced members of our team are tandem mentors of their own experiences and character and support not only the clinical development of younger colleagues by passing on their knowhow but also their entire personality," explains Prof. Franz-Josef Kramer, Director of the clinic. "In contrast to structured mentoring programs offered by various institutions, interprofessional mentors within the clinic can pass on their experiences much more specifically and authentically." "For me, mentoring means an effective support in my clinical development and also an expansion of my professional horizons. The feedback and contacts with experienced professionals enable a change of perspectives for me and give me new impulses in my clinical development and project work," reports Dr. Benedict Jürgensen, Assistant Doctor in his third year of residency training in Bonn. Regular, structured and trusted exchange is relevant for effective mentoring. Both mutual trust and appreciation are essential.

Through mentoring, mentees have the opportunity to get to know and

to assess their own abilities better and to receive support in selected activities. This often makes it possible to identify new areas of interest and develop their own career in partnership. The prospects for mentors lie in receiving fresh ideas and impulses from young academics and developing gualified young talent for their own clinics. Practical experience shows that an intensive collaboration and communication structure even across departmental and organizational boundaries is promoted through mentoring and that positive effects such as strategical thinking or project development occur almost automatically.

As an example, the activities of Dr. Jürgensen led to a new teaching project within our OMFS clinic and resulted in us being awarded this year's teaching prize by the University of Bonn.

#### EUROPEAN COLLABORATIVE PROJECT WITH A CRANIO-MAXILLO-FACIAL MULTIDISCIPLINARY UNIT IN MWANZA, TANZANIA

n the first week of November 2023, we started this new project with the Bugando Medical Center (BMC), in Mwanza, Tanzania, for collaboration in the development of a Multidisciplinary Unit of Craniomaxillofacial Surgery.

During that week a Spanish-Italian team, headed by Domenico Scopelliti and Fernando Garcia Marin visited the BMC to give a few days of theoretical and practical training and to hold several meetings with the hospital management to advance this collaborative project.

The Bugando Medical Centre is the second largest hospital in Tanzania and serves a population of about 20 million people, one third of the Tanzanian population. It serves especially large rural regions around Lake Victoria, where cranio-maxillo-facial care is virtually non-existent. So far, many of these patients die or survive

> with severe sequelae and stigmata due to pathologies that would have a solution in our environment.

In sub-Saharan Africa, 93% of the population has difficulty accessing safe, timely and affordable surgical services. Cranio-maxillofacial pathology is part of this great tragedy of lack of access to surgery in these countries and few people, if any, have access to treatment for these problems, which include malformations, benign and malignant tumours, trauma and its sequelae, infections, etc.

Oral and maxillofacial surgery operates already as a small unit within the Dental Department in BMC. It was established in 2018 with only 3 staff in the department, one oral and maxillofacial surgeon and 2 dental surgeons.

The BMC has therefore decided to develop this Cranio-maxillo-facial Multidisciplinary Unit in order to establish a long-term sustainable service for patients with craniomaxillofacial pathologies to have access to a comprehensive treatment programme at this Hospital.

The most important factor for the future development of surgical services in sub-Saharan Africa is the training of surgeons, anaesthetists and other healthcare personnel. This is the area where international



organisations can help the most through financial and educational support.

Therefore, the main objective of our project is to support the training of local surgeons through an exchange programme between the BMC and various organizations and institutions within the MAX TRAIN platform of the EACMFS.

At the moment we have funds to initiate a fellowship programme, whereby two surgeons from Bugando Medical Center will spend a one-year training period in European hospitals and in India. These funds have been donated by the British organisation Future Faces and with the help of EACMFS itself.

In addition, the Smile House Fondazione, led by Domenico Scopelliti, intends to establish one of its cleft lip and palate training sites at BMC. The collaboration project will also include visits to BMC by European specialists to provide theoretical and practical training in the field, financing of patients' expenses, financing of equipment and infrastructure and continuous support with permanent communication throughout the year between the specialists in Tanzania and the medical teams in the international organizations to cover all healthcare needs.

To make all this possible, we need the help of all interested organizations and institutions. This is a multi-partner project, which so far has the collaboration of the following (and is open to new partners):

he first time that I heard about the Leibinger Award I was still a medical student, attending the University of Rome "Sapienza" and beginning my first experiences in an Oral and Maxillofacial unit. So, I started developing my career with the possibilities of a student: going abroad to collect new experiences, opening books to get familiar with the field, and getting inspired by the literature to write articles. After years, I was finally in the position to apply for the Leibinger Award, and Prof. Angelo was the first person I called to ask for hospitality. At 23:07 on 29/09/2022, no more than 15 minutes after receiving the award, we were on the phone laughing and already planning what to do together in Lisbon. I arrived in Portugal on 03/03/2023, and it was at that moment that everything changed.

My reception at Instituto Portugues da Face (IPF) by Professor Angelo and his entire team was exemplary. I was received very warmly, with careful planning of all my activities week by week. I had the specific opportunity to deepen and refine the diagnostic-therapeutic course of temporomandibular disorders. I was able to practice arthrocentesis, arthroscopy, and open surgery of the temporomandibular

joint as first aid, and successively also as a first surgeon, under tutorage. I joined 70+ surgical procedures practicing all subspecialties of maxillofacial surgery. During my stay, I had the opportunity of being selected as Assistant Editor of the European Journal of Stomatology, Oral and Facial Surgery. I had the great honor of applying for a Ph.D. at the University of Lisbon.

## Prof. Dr. Peter Egyedi 1930-2023

#### 'IN OUR PROFESSION, ON THE SHOULDERS OF GIANTS WE STAND'

This typically surgical expression fits professor dr. Peter Egyedi, who sadly passed away on October 3rd 2023 at 92 years of age.

Peter was born on December 8<sup>th</sup> 1930. After difficult years in the second world war, he was trained both in dentistry and medicine. Following an initial education in general surgery, he then trained in cranio-maxillofacial surgery in Zürich, Switzerland under Prof. Hugo Obwegeser in 1962.

After some years in Liberia, Sydney and again in Zürich, he returned to The Netherlands to become head of the

Department of Maxillofacial surgery at the University Hospital Utrecht from 1973 to 1985 and later again from 1992 to 1996. There he proved an excellent clinician and teacher who treated many cleft patients, introduced orthognathic surgery and comprehensive surgical treatment of maxillofacial oncology patients. He was the first to describe the application of "the buccal fat pad" in closure of the maxillary sinus and discussed the technique of the "degloving of the nose" for difficult cleft noses. He was member of the Editorial Board of the Journal of Cranio-Maxillofacial Surgery for many years, writer of multiple scientific articles and promotor of several dissertations.

In the 70's and 80's he was ahead of time in discussing medical complications. These were held once a year in January at the Department in Utrecht and attracted many colleagues. Members of staff and trainees were stimulated to present and discuss their biggest failures of the year, stimulated by Peter himself who kept up a diary on his own complications during his whole working life. Trainees and staff were advised to keep up such a diary by themselves as well and to read over it regularly. He disliked medical protocols and rather encouraged his trainees and staff to analyse maxillofacial cases and its appropriate treatment themselves. We will remember Peter for his knowledge, creativeness, witticisms and even more for his modesty and the opportunities he created for his staff and trainees to experiment and learn new techniques. If something went wrong, he was always there to protect and help his colleagues. That is how many of us were stimulated and felt supported by him and could learn from our mistakes. Under Peter, in all 21 maxillofacial surgeons were trained.

With this in mind, we truly can call Peter Egyedi a giant on whose shoulders we cranio-maxillofacial surgeons all stand.



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
